Like so many other little boys who attended Backyard Bible Club regularly, cute little 4<sup>th</sup> grade Michael was growing up without a dad at home and, though it was 20 some years ago, I still remember clearly the day Michael set those words in stone around the center of his calling.

It was after the lesson, as I was handing out good listener prizes, when I felt a tug on my shirt. It was Michael, wanting to tell me about an incident that happened the previous day of school where another boy had tried to pick a fight with him. I said, "I'm sorry Michael, what happened?", and he told me that, although it was hard, he just walked away.

While keeping my eye on the prize box *(so the other boys wouldn't steal me blind)*, I gave him a side hug, tousled his hair, told him I was proud of him, and then turned my attention back to the prize box.

I felt another tug on my shirt, turned, and saw that it was Michael again. He hadn't finished telling me about what

I realized right away that coming to this neighborhood once a week after school was important. This little boy, who had no dad at home, and virtually no consistent church or faith-message background, was catching and internalizing the truth of what sets men of God apart... well, let's just say I knew I was right where the Lord wanted me to be.
